There is a range of fake news: from crazy stories which people easily recognize to more subtle types of misinformation. Experts in media studies and online psychology have been examining the fake news phenomenor Read these tips, and don't get fooled!
First of all, check the <u>source</u> . Look at the website where the story comes from. Does it look real? Is the text we written? Are there a variety of other stories or is it just one story? Fake news websites often use <u>addresses</u> that sound like real newspapers, but don't have many real stories <u>about</u> other topics. If you aren't sure, click on the 'About' page and look for a clear description of the organization. 2-
Second, watch out for fake photos. Many fake news stories use <u>images</u> that are <u>photoshopped</u> or taken from a <u>unrelated</u> site. Sometimes, if you just look closely at an image, search.
Moreover, check the story is in other places. Look to see if the story you are reading is on other news sites that yo know and trust. If you do find it on many other sites, then it probably isn't <u>fake</u> (although there are som exceptions), <u>[4-</u> ].
Finally, look for other <u>signs</u> . There are other techniques that fake news uses. These include using ALL CAPS and lot of ads that pop up when you click on a link. Also, think about how the story makes you feel. 5-
If you know these things about online news, and can apply them in your everyday life, then you have the controver what to read, what to believe and most importantly what to share. If you find a news story that you know fake, the most important advice is: don't share it!
